RECAPPING THE SUMMER OF 2001

Unlike its predecessor the summer of '01 was hot(!), hot(!!), hot(!!!) with little (very little) rainfall!!! Kamaji's waterfront was a "happening place" day-after-day as campers, staff, and even Ye Directors sought relief in the waters of Wolf Lake. In spite of interminable heat which left us more than a little drained by each day's end ~ the spirit, the enthusiasm, the energy level, the spontaneity of campers and staff alike never waned!! If anything, each made the best of every single moment of every single day. Exhausted by day's end (which as you well know does not really happen until after 9:30 taps each evening), most went to bed happily refreshed by a late-evening dip in Wolf Lake...and always looking ahead to what the next day might bring.

Camper-wise, our numbers swelled with 164 first session campers and 162 first session campers ~ in spite of our best efforts to keep enrollment to 150 campers per session. Of the total camper enrollment, we had 12 first session campers, 11 second session campers and 13 eight-week campers who have been to Kamaji 5+ summers. We also had 12 Counselors-in-Training (CITs) ~ all of whom have been campers at Kamaji for 5+ summers. And, of our 65 staff members (not including Ye Directors, the CITs or our weekto-week camp doctors), 18 had been at Kamaji a minimum of 5 summers with 8 of those having been at camp 10+ years. Ye Directors spent our 22nd summer at Kamaji. Three of our camp physicians also marked milestone summers at Kamaji, two for five and a third for ten consecutive summers!!!

We gave out a total of 21 commemorative paddles to campers and staff (including two camp doctors) who were spending their fifth summer at Kamaji; and, three Kamaji blankets to staff (including one camp doc) who spent 10 summers at camp.

We did not add any new activities to our instructional program and, instead, chose to teach well those programs already in place. We did add five new Barnett sailboats to our existing fleet and several new sailboards for younger campers in our windsurfing program. Outside of the usual activity expendable supplies, we did little purchasing as activities are really in good shape! Instead, we ended up FINALLY paying off camp...which means we now own Kamaji "free and clear" ~ a great feeling to be sure after 20+ years of being indebted. The other great thing is that we aren't even close to retirement so we can put the no-longer-necessary monthly mortgage payment monies to good use somewhere else at Kamaji!

In terms of structural work last summer, our year-round caretaker Joe Drake (who has now been at Kamaji year 'round for 11 years!!!) completed

Temporary renovation of the old, old "Club Med" ~ which still needs some serious updating, reroofing, shoring up, etc. This building was the "original" directors' house when Phil and Bert first lived at Kamaji. Joe did tie in this building's septic lines to a newer septic system ~ with this being the last building in camp to be served by one of three septic systems in camp. What a far cry from the days of yore when there were PGs and cold-water washhouse troughs and lake wash-ups!! Believe it or not, all those are now "banned" by either the American Camping Association, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Natural Resources, etc.

- ► Installation of heating (no cooling©) to the Doctor's Cube
- Replacement of all double-hung windows in "old" dining room - the original windows still held the 1928 stickers marked Dickinson Lumber Company when they were removed.
- Replacement of the huge church-like Lodge windows overlooking Wolf Lake. (Kamaji's Lodge is testimony to Marvin Windows's claim that it can replace/replicate any window!)

Overall, the summer of 2001 was a healthy, safe, fun, happy and kid-centered season. As always, we breathed a huge sigh of relief after the campers and staff had returned home safe and sound to their families. We truly owe our terrific staff, our fun-loving campers and the Great Spirit a resounding "Thanks!" for a wonderful season.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2002

With a camper return rate of 80% we don't have to look for too many new campers for next summer. In fact, of the 158 alreadyenrolled first and 148 second session campers, only 60 total will be first time Kamaji campers in 2002. With the exception of a limited number of openings first session for girls who are currently in 4th grade first session and second session for those currently in 4th. 5th or 6th grade, we have begun a waiting list for the remaining age groups. Needless to say, we are thrilled that our enrollment is almost completely full at such an early date and by so many returning campers!! We are already off to a great start for Kamaji's 2002 season. . .and camp hasn't even begun yet!!!

As always, we owe a huge "THANKS!" for the loyalty and support of all our camp families ~ past, including alum, and present ~ without which Kamaji would not thrive!

Since enrollment is 100% dependent upon word-of-mouth referrals, we are always seeking the names of interested camp families from our current and past camp families as well as alumnae. We would appreciate your contacting us at our toll free number ~ 800/7KAMAJI (800/752-6254) if you know of anyone who might be interested in attending Kamaji in future summers. As always, we thank you!

Our most immediate plans for 2002 include the hiring of qualified staff to work at Kamaji. Unlike last summer when, with the thenbooming economy all camps had a hard time finding quality staff to work, fortunately (or unfortunately depending on your perspective) there is a huge pool of staff applicants who have already applied. Additionally, our yearround Assistant Director Cally Mastio already has received 29 signed contracts from former Kamaji staff who will be returning this summer; she's also hired 9 new staff so far; and has 4 CITs lined up to date. To say that Cally is persistent and diligent in keeping on top of staff retainment, recruitment, etc. would be a huge understatement! As always, we depend upon word-of-mouth staff referrals so, again, if you know anyone who might be interested in working at Kamaji next summer, let us know!

LOOKING AHEAD (CONT'D)

Plans for building/renovations for 2002 include:

- Completing renovations on the "old" section of Kamaji's dining room which includes hanging a tongue-and-groove wood ceiling & completing paneling of the dining room walls;
- tiling the bathroom floors of 2nd floor bathrooms in staff housing
- building a wooden walkway/stairway from Nutshell cabin down to waterfront and "Yacht Club"
- new construction of one, possibly, two additional cabins for

administrative staff housing

- revisiting idea of tearing down old storage/laundry facility and replacing with, minimally, an organized, planned storage building OR (in my dreams@!!) a new Club Med
- re-construction of storm-devastated low ropes course.

Program-wise, we are still giving serious thought to adding a climbing wall at camp. First, though, we need to get input from other camps who have done this to make sure that this will not be a "passing fancy." (Remember the computer camps of the 80s!!??)

Those are our immediate plans for the summer of 2002. Of course, as the season approaches, we often find our list of "Things to Do" grows increasingly longer with priorities changing daily. First and foremost, though, we will continue to work hard to insure that Kamaji will continue in the same tradition as it has for the past 88 summers!



REFLECTIONS OF KAMAJI ALUMNAE

From Evy Towle Schneider (Minneapolis, MN '43): "I remember we had to learn every camper's name and be able to go around the Friday night campfire and identify them when it was our tribe's turn to conduct campfire. Siggy Sletten was Grand Tai and beat the drum on campfire nights. The Catholic girls went in to Cass Lake for Mass on Sundays, but we also had Vespers on Sunday evenings. We had "summer skiing". . . There was a hill on which loads of pine needles were dumped which made it slippery enough to ski down. Margery Benedickter Bailey was a counselor and the ski instructor. I think she may have been in the Olympics in the 30s? (Although I was a camper for one summer, I absolutely loved it (camp) and among other things made one lifelong friend, whom coincidentally I heard from today. (I also remember) Margery the

counselor whom we called "Benny". There were a lot of Minneapolis girls there, the Velies, Ouida Heffelfinger, Anner Williamson, Marilyn Williams and her cousin Nancy...and Bess House from Rock Island ~ the were all fabulous and fun! "HELLO TO ALL!"

LYNN NAECKEL (Davenport, IA '49-'55) writes "When I took my granddaughter to visit Kamaji, I had a strange experience. We got to the spot on the path into camp where I'd first said "Wow!" at the age of ten, right in front of Bert and Phil's house. We stood there for a moment, taking it all in. No one was around. Suddenly the back door of the Lodge banged open and slammed as a tall rangy blond in white shorts and shirt came out and strode up the path towards Cabin 3. I actually stared to yell "Greener!" before realizing where I was

in time. Talk about deja vu! The next summer I went back with **ANNE RUEFFEL** Gilbert (Davenport, IA '50-'53) and we had such a great time talking to campers and counselors. I remember many years ago when Phil said, 'The face are the same, only the names are different.' I didn't see it then, but she was so right."



Newsworthy Happenings

FAQs

Because we don't always find the time to individually answer questions posed in correspondence from alum, we thought we could answer Frequently Asked Questions here:

Q. What is a ropes course?

- **A.** Typically a ropes course is an outdoor experience of mental and physical challenges utilizing ropes, balance beams and strategic games. A challenge Ropes Course then can be defined as a series of supervised individual and group challenges that promote a combination of teamwork skills and individual commitment. Two types of activities are involved in the Ropes Course, all requiring trust, effective communication and mutual support for success. High elements rise up to 30 feet above the ground; and low elements, which is what Kamaji has, are at ground level. Some may involve physical activity, while others focus mainly on creative thinking and problem-solving. One of the best ways to raise young peoples' self-esteem, confidence and social development skills is to immerse them in experiential, cooperative, hands-on experiences in the outdoors or other alternative environments that challenge youth mentally, physically and spiritually. That is what Kamaii attempts to do through the use of its Low Ropes Course.
- Q. I don't remember what the "outhouses" were called ~ please tell me!
- **A.** The answer is "hidden" in several places throughout this newsletter.
- Q. I am not sure what the name of my tribe was although I know we were GREEN!
 Was it Metig?
- A. "Once a Metig, always a Metig!" ~ that's what we say at Kamaji. You did not forget the name of your tribe or its color. It's amazing how many alumna write in and, while she may not have the exact spelling of her tribe, she rarely (if ever) forgets its name and she never, ever forgets its color!!!
- Q. We had "summer skiing" ~ do you still have that?
- A. You had "pine needle" skiing. We know it was at camp through the 1940s as we have pictures showing the girls, on wooden skis with bindings and using poles, traversing down a hillside of pine needles. We don't offer pine needles skiing as an activity any longer; in fact, we are clueless where the ski hill was at Kamaji. However, we do have in the Lodge a set of skis once used for "summer skiing" at Kamaji.

Please know that we are really want to continue to be in touch with our Kamaji alumnae and are happy to do so. . .but **only if** you express interest in being on our mailing list. If we don't hear from you, we will assume you no longer wish to receive mailings from us and will suspend any future mailings.
